THE DRAFT SCOTTISH MARINE REGIONS ORDER 2013

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ANNEX 1: CROWN ESTATE RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION ON DRAFT ORDER FOR SCOTTISH MARINE REGIONS.

Key points

Marine Region Boundaries

- It is important that Marine Region boundaries facilitate effective marine planning and for this reason, we
 consider that Marine Region boundaries should align with physical features rather than being derived as an
 extension of terrestrial planning boundaries.
- We recognise that the boundaries will inevitably intersect seabed or coastal areas with existing TCE leases. However, where existing (and future) marine and coastal activities do straddle more than one administrative marine boundary, it is important that the management and regulation of these activities remains consistent, even if the activity is to be considered in multiple plans or by multiple regulators at different times. In particular, we draw your attention to the following proposed renewable energy locations which straddle, or are in close proximity to, the boundary between Marine Regions:
 - Mull of Kintyre, tidal demonstration site this site straddles the Argyll & Clyde Scottish Marine Regions.
 - Ness of Duncansby, tidal development this site straddles the North Coast and Moray Scottish Marine Regions.

Detailed maps of these sites can be found in Annex 2 and 3.

Interaction with other plans and policies

We note that the development of the Pilot Marine Spatial Plan for the Pentland Firth and Orkney Waters
(PFOW) is ongoing. The PFOW Marine Plan area overlaps with two of the proposed Marine Regions – the
North Coast and Orkney Marine Regions. Further clarity on how these administrative regions will interact is
required in order to ensure that the Pilot Plan and the future plans for the North Coast and Orkney Marine
Regions are consistent and can deliver the objectives set for each area.

Consultation Questions

 Do you agree with the proposals set out in the draft Scottish Marine Regions Order 2013? If no, please explain why not and your suggested alternative(s).

No. We have some concerns regarding the boundaries as currently proposed.

• We have some concerns regarding the practicability of the boundary line running through the Sound of Mull and Loch Linnhe (between Argyll and West Highland Marine Regions) in terms of its ability to deliver effective marine planning. This is particularly relevant given that that Sound of Mull was selected as a pilot marine plan under the Scottish Sustainable Marine Environment Initiative (SSMEI) on the basis that the area could provide lessons for the future in marine planning across regulatory/authority boundaries. The project concluded that the Sound of Mull should be treated as a single entity and, therefore, we recommend that

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the boundary is revised to ensure a more coherent approach to marine planning which is not based on extensions to existing terrestrial planning boundaries.

- As discussed above, we also have some concerns regarding the Pentland Firth and Orkney Waters area. The
 PFOW Marine Plan area overlaps with two of the proposed Marine Regions the North Coast and Orkney
 Marine Regions. Further clarity on how these administrative regions will interact is required in order to
 ensure that the Pilot Plan and the future plans for the North Coast and Orkney Marine Regions are consistent
 and deliver the objectives set for each plan.
- In addition, we have some concerns about the feasibility of managing the area to the west of John O'Groats
 where there are three Marine Regions in a relatively small area. We would suggest that the North Coast
 Marine Region need not extend out to the 12nm limit.
