4 (b)

We think that paragraph 14 needs to be clarified. We have some concern how this will be assessed and monitored by local authorities. While we support the principle that carers are supported to maintain their social networks by local authorities we have some concerns on financial sustainability if, for example, the local authority is expected in some cases to meet the cost of taxi fares for carers to meet friends. We concur that the local authority should pay for replacement care, which would be chargeable, to the cared for person to enable the carer to attend various social activities if it is an assessed need.
