Female Genital Mutilation

(FGM) is also known as cutting, and sometimes referred to as female circumcision. FGM has no benefits and is not supported by any religion.

FGM and health

FGM can affect women and girls health in many ways, such as:

- Sore back
- Stomach pains or swollen stomach
- Infections
- Difficulty passing urine
- Difficulty in pregnancy and labour
- Sexual health problems
- Emotional health problems (flashback, low self-esteem, anxiety, depression)

How Health Services can help

If you have been affected by FGM in any way, the health service can help you. You can speak to your doctor (GP), health visitor, midwife or you can go to a sexual health clinic. In most cases the health staff from these services will be able to provide you with information, advice and any support you may require. They may also refer you to other services if appropriate and if you agree. Remember, doctors and nurses will not judge you and will treat you with respect.

In Scotland you have a right to free health care whatever your immigration status. You still have that right if you have had a claim for asylum refused by the Home office.

Interpreting services will be provided if you need them. Let the service know that you will need an interpreter when you are making your appointment.

If you are having a clinical examination and you would prefer a female or male examiner please ask the health worker.

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FGM and the law

FGM is a crime in Scotland and throughout the UK. It is against the law to carry out FGM in Scotland or to take a girl abroad for FGM. It is also a crime for a person to assist or arrange the FGM of another person, even if the FGM occurs outside Scotland. A person convicted of an offence under the Scotland FGM Act 2005 is liable to imprisonment for up to14 years.

Concerned about a girl at risk of FGM?

If you are concerned about a girl of any age, whether it is your daughter or any other girl who may be at risk of FGM, you can speak to a nursery or school teacher, to a health visitor or midwife or your doctor, or to a social worker. In an emergency call 999 and ask for the police.
