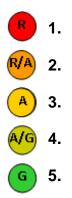

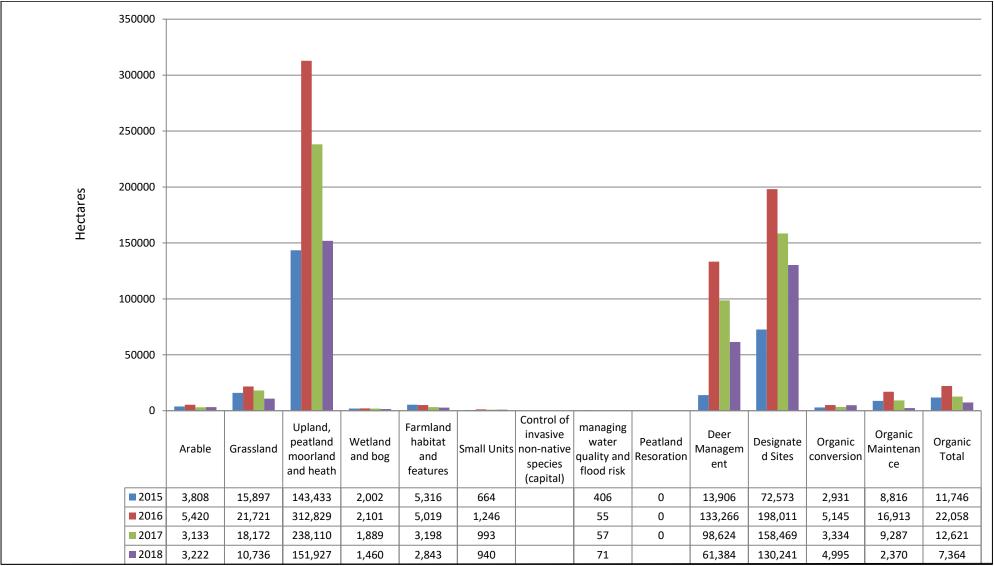

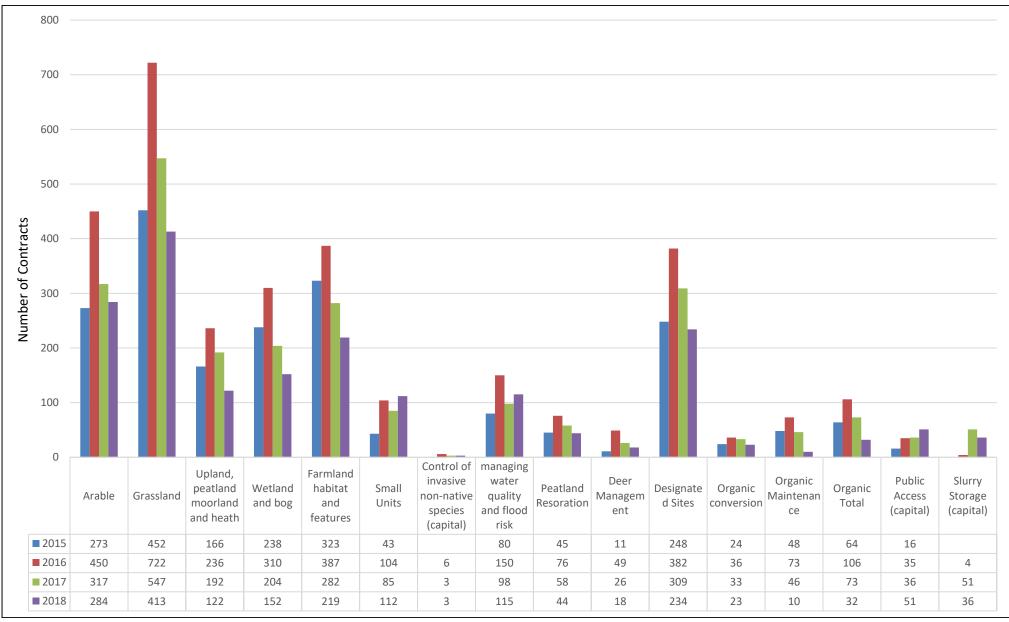

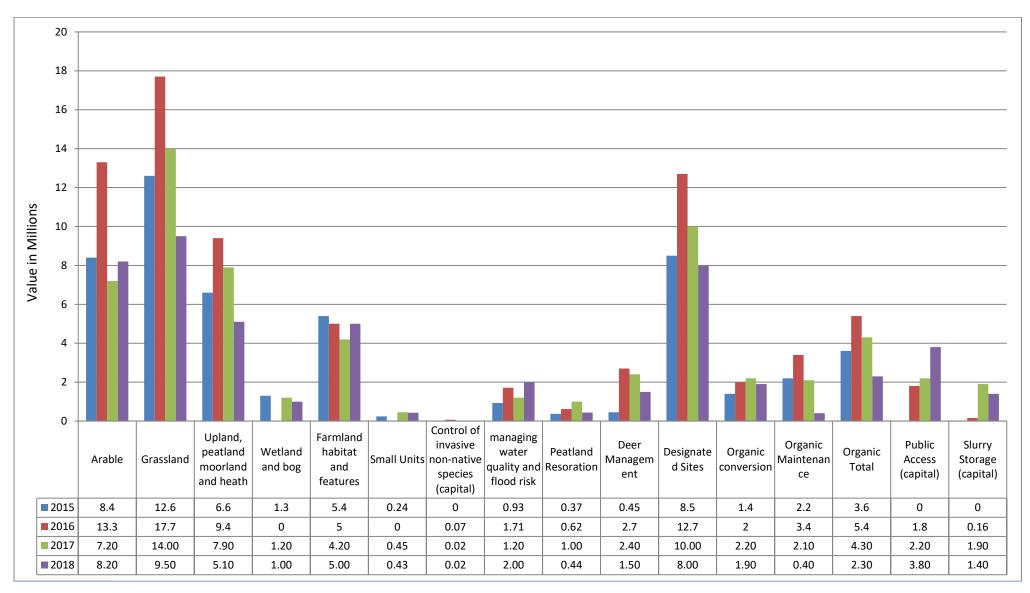

### **AECS AREA MANAGED**





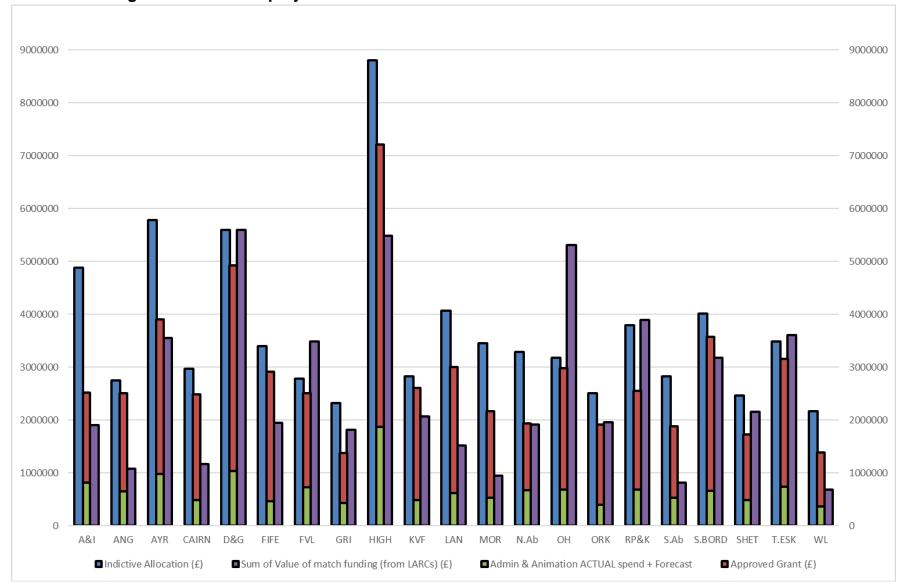


## TOTAL VALUE APPROVED 2015, 2016, 2017 & 2018

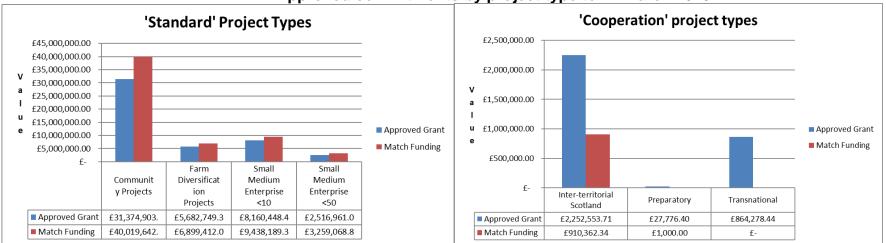

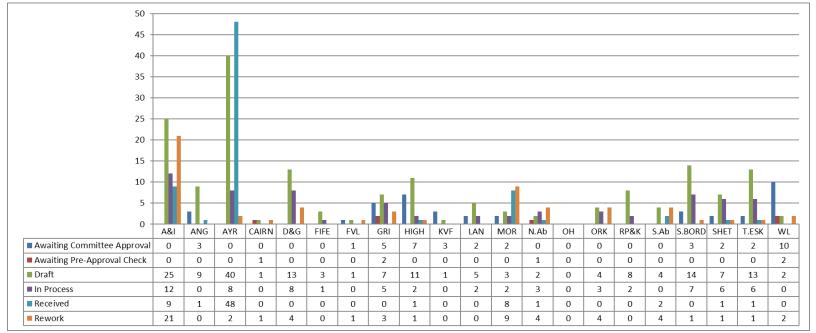


### LEADER LAG Budget allocation and project commitments to 12 March 2019
