SRDP Progress / RDOC Update - October 2019

Introduction

1. The Rural Development Operational Committee (RDOC), which forms part of the SRDP programme governance structure, met on the 04 October. Papers tabled at the RDOC meeting will be made available on the website: www.gov.scot/groups/srdp-2014---2020-rural-development-operational-committee.

SRDP progress

- 2. The programme continues to progress well in delivery of funds, to date the programme has approved over 14,000 applications, along with supporting around 11,300 farmers and crofters each year through the Less Favoured Area Support Scheme (LFASS). This totals nearly £1bn of new agreements, out of a total budget of £1.26bn.
- 3. Scheme demand remains strong although some have committed their full budget allocation and are currently closed. The 2019 application round for the Agri-Environment Climate Scheme (AECS) has closed and applications are being assessed. This was a smaller application round and the assumption is there has been a reluctance to commit to 5 year contracts during Brexit uncertainty. The latest Knowledge Transfer and Innovation Fund (KTIF) applications are being considered.
- 4. Modification 6 is being progressed and the RDOC was provided with an overview of the proposals:
 - Changes to the financial and indicator plans
 - Change to the LFASS 2020 payment rate (to the maximum permissible)
 - Removal of the Joint Programme Monitoring Committee (JPMC)
- 5. The financial changes had been modelled, there had been an initial submission to the Commission and engagement will continue.
- 6. Monitoring of the SRDP continues with several reviews recently completed or are in process. This includes the Food Processing Marketing and Co-operation (FPMC) Scheme review that has been published, an evaluation of LEADER that will cover the entire 26 years, a review of the Scottish Rural Network, a review of FPMC and LEADER grants, and an AECS evaluation.

Budgets

- 7. SRDP budget is mainly committed at this stage of the programme and there is limited scope for change. We await the next Scottish Government budget.
- 8. No decisions have yet been taken about convergence money.
- 9. There is one remaining opportunity within the programme for a pillar to pillar transfer and it would need to be approved by the end of the year. This would include any capping of direct payments for the 2020 scheme year and was a ministerial decision.

EU exit and future policy

- 10. The EU Exit date remains the 31 October 2019 pending any agreement, extension or legal action. If we leave with no deal existing CAP rules will be transferred into domestic law via the EU Withdrawal Act, as retained EU law:
 - Without primary legislation (Rural Support Bill) we are unable to make any changes beyond what CAP currently permits through delegated powers.
 - The requirement for the RDOC and reporting will remain in place with the only change being who we report to.
 - Programme modifications will involve Parliamentary scrutiny.
- 11. The SG announced a National Basic Payment Loan Scheme to support farmers and crofters in the event of a no deal Brexit. On 04 October the first payments arrived in bank accounts. It totals £327.17 million to more than 13,450 applicants. This is the single biggest mitigation action the SG can provide at this time.
- 12. Funding guarantees SRDP projects are guaranteed, for the lifetime of the project, where contracts are entered into before 31 December 2020. There is a pledge to maintain the budget for 'farm support' until the end of the current UK Parliament, however it is not clear what counts as 'farm support'. Ministers and stakeholders continue to push for all Pillar 2 (and Pillar 1) to be guaranteed in full.
- 13. 2021 24: Proposals focus on retaining existing CAP schemes, in broad terms, to provide certainty for farmers and land managers, while simplifying the administration of those schemes. Officials are working on proposals to deliver our agriculture, crofting and rural support from 2021 based on the Stability and Simplicity consultation and input from the Simplification Taskforce. We anticipate stakeholder engagement later this year/early 2020.
- 14. 2024: A Parliamentary debate in January agreed that the principles of longer term future policy should include: sustainability; simplicity; innovation; inclusion; productivity; and profitability. The Farming and Food Production Future Policy Group was establish in 2019 to advise on the development of this future policy.
- 15. No substantial progress on the next CAP is expected until the appointment of a new European Commission and decisions on the MFF budget. We hope for some clarity in October/November. It is expected that there will be a delay in the implementation of the new CAP.
