Progress Update from Previous report		RAG
1.	The Scottish Government is investing £110 million in the Primary Care Fund (PCF) in 2018-19 to support implementation of the new GP contract and wider primary care reform. This includes several different funding lines, including the Primary Care Transformation fund and the Primary Care Mental Health Fund. To date, £10m has been invested via PCMHF to encourage the development of new models of care to ensure that people with mental health problems get the right treatment, in the right place, at the right time. In 2018/19, a further £5.5 million of funding will be released and primary care improvement plans must demonstrate how this is being used to re-design primary care services to ensure that those who need mental health support can access it when they need it. 2.	The Scottish School of Primary Care has undertaken an formal evaluation of the projects funded by the PCTF and the PCMHF to provide evidence to support different models of primary care. The evaluation comprises 5 case studies with a geographic focus (Inverclyde; Lanarkshire; Ayrshire and Arran; Tayside; Highlands and Islands) and 2 with a thematic focus (Advanced Nurse Practitioners; and MSK practitioners).
