

The OHIFG understands the need for a network of MPA's in Scotland and would support it in general, but only insofar that the economic and social needs of our domestic fleet are recognised and given due consideration in the assessment process. It is a well recognised fact that our fishermen have fished sustainably over and through a range of marine features and for a wide variety of species for many generations and these features and to a great extent species are still there in significant quantities.

Commercial fishing methods have been developed to release juveniles and modern technology is being used to avoid sensitive areas where there are known features that are of significant importance to the marine environment. Current fishing practices and activities within the proposed MPAs have been at a level which has been in balance with the features being protected and in good condition. Effective zoning of fishing within proposed MPAs can be managed to reduce economic impact on commercial fishing whilst protecting the features within the site.

The biggest risk to damage of features within proposed MPAs will be larger vessels using heavier gear. Management plans should be developed to consider the risk of larger vessels using heavy gear operating within an MPAs and if necessary only vessels below a certain gross registered tonnage and horsepower be permitted to operate within MPAs as a control measure to protect the protected features.

The reference to set nets being a risk should only make reference to surface set nets which pose a threat to quillemots, whilst, bottom set nets are not a threat to birds. The tangle net fishery which is current prohibited due to emergency West of Scotland emergency cod recovery measure is usually a season fishery from April until September and due to its high value is of significant economic important to the static gear fleet of Benbecula and North Uist. Future management measures should take account of this important fishery which is not considered to be a risk to the population of guillemots on the Monach Isles, with their numbers remaining high giving a clear indication that fishing practices have not posed a risk to their numbers.</pre></pre>
